This term we will be learning...

Area of learning	Objectives to be covered
Communication and Language	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Enjoy listening to longer stories and can remember much of what happens. • Can find it difficult to pay attention to more than one thing at a time. • Understand a question or instruction that has two parts, such as “Get your coat and wait at the door”.
Personal, Social and Emotional Development	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Select and use activities and resources, with help when needed. This helps them to achieve a goal they have chosen, or one which is suggested to them. • Show more confidence in new social situations.
Physical Development	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Continue to develop their movement, balancing, riding (scooters, trikes and bikes) and ball skills. • Use large-muscle movements to wave flags and streamer, paint and make marks. • Go up steps and stairs, or climb up apparatus, using alternate feet. • Start eating independently and learning how to use a knife and fork. • Use large and small motor skills to do things independently, for example manage buttons and zips, and pour drinks.
Literacy	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Ask questions about the book. • Notice some print, such as the first letter of their name, a bus or door number, or a familiar logo.
Maths	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • React to changes of amount in a group of up to three items. • Build with a range of resources. • Recite numbers past 5 • Say one number for each item in order 1,2,3,4,5 • Compare sizes, weights etc. using gesture and language - ‘bigger/little/smaller’, ‘high/low’, ‘tall’, ‘heavy’. • Notice patterns and arrange things in patterns.
Understanding the World	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Make connections between the features of their family and other families. • Notice differences between people • Begin to make sense of their own life-story and family’s history. • Use all their senses in hands-on exploration of natural materials. • Explore collections of materials with similar and/or different properties.
Expressive Arts and Design	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Express ideas and feelings through making marks, and sometimes give a meaning to the marks they make. • Enjoy and take part in action songs, such as ‘Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star’. • Start to develop pretend play, pretending that one object represents another. For example, a child holds a wooden block to her ear and pretends it’s a phone. • Explore different materials, using all their senses to investigate them. Manipulate and play with different materials. • Use their imagination as they consider what they can do with different materials. • Make simple models which express their ideas. • Join different materials and explore different textures. • Explore colour and colour-mixing.
